WHAT IS THE REFUGEE EXPERIENCE?

Upon arrival in the United States, refugee families have the support of local resettlement agencies for 3-6 months, on average. Newly arrived refugees immediately search for a job and begin the hard work of integrating into a new culture. While many refugees come to the U.S. with experience in agriculture and sewing, making a livelihood in these industries in the United States can be difficult.

"Someone who has been forced to flee his or her country because of persecution, war, or violence. A refugee has a well-founded fear of persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, political opinion or membership in a particular social group."

Who Are We?

MULTICULTURAL REFUGEE COALITION is an innovative nonprofit organization blending skills-based education with social entrepreneurship to connect refugees to dignified, fair-wage work in Austin, Texas.



OPEN ARMS STUDIO is a textile manufacturer employing refugees at a fair wage in Austin, Texas through advanced sewing training and fair-wage employment.

NEW LEAF AGRICULTURE connects refugee families to the land, by operating a community garden and training skilled farmers to contribute to our local commercial farm.

SHARED VOICES LANGUAGE SERVICES offers professional interpreter training courses to both refugees and other bilingual community members.

We believe in the potential of all refugees to support their families & contribute to their communities through meaningful, dignified, living-wage work.

Why Austin, Texas?

Since 2010, more refugees have been resettled in Texas than any other state. In 2019 alone, Texas led the nation in resettling 2,458 refugees.



Our staff is made up of refugees and immigrants from Burma, Afghanistan, Bhutan, Eritrea, Mexico and Democratic Republic of Congo

OUR TENTH YEAR

In 2009, MRC began with a goal to support newly resettled refugees in Austin. In our tenth year, we grew to employ 22 refugees and immigrants in dignified, fair-wage work, making several milestones along the way and built a diverse community of people that are passionate about creating livelihood opportunities for refugees. MRC and The Open Arms Studio opened the doors to a brand new studio and administrative space, nearly six times bigger than our first studio!

New Leaf Agriculture launched our very own Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program

Open Arms kicked off a new partnership with Project Repat, giving us the opportunity to expand both our studio space and team

We celebrated our 10th anniversary at A Cause for Celebration, featuring unique bites from local chefs and a sold-out crowd of long-time supporters and new friends

Shared Voices began working with California Rural Legal Assistance for our first ever out-of-state interpreting training assessments



3 refugees trained through Shared Voices in 2019 *2 out of 3 at **NO cost to them**






It is great to see interest from local interpreters in more specialized interpreter training, because it really shows that we care about serving our Limited English Proficiency community well.

SHARED VOICES LANGUAGE SERVICES

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IN THE CLASSROOM

ENGLISH AS SECOND LANGUAGE (ESL):

ESL courses are led each week by experienced volunteers at The Open Arms Studio. Courses range in content and difficulty depending on the ability and needs of our staff. In some cases, our refugee staff is not just learning a new language, but being taught literacy for the first time.

DIGITAL LITERACY:

Digital literacy training provides the ability to use information and communicate using digital technologies, such as email and spreadsheets. This year, we began training one member of our refugee staff in Google Suite programs. In 2019, we taught 263 hours of ESL courses and 6 hours of digital literacy to refugee staff at the Open Arms Studio.
